This Lessons and Carols service has only continued due to the generosity of so many as listed inside the front cover of the service booklet. However, a few extra special efforts need to be acknowledged. Firstly, many choristers from several neighbouring parishes, join our local choir to make an augmented choir that can answer the challenge of presenting carols such as John Rutter's "Angels'Carol" and Anna Page's "Candlelight Alleluia."

The standard achieved is a direct result of Edith Webster OAM (2013). Edith has the musical knowledge, experience, enthusiasm and encouraging techniques to lift each choir member to their best possible standard. Each choir member is so grateful for all of her efforts.

Very few of us realise how much time and effort Chris Bowes donates with leading the music planning group, playing the organ throughout the practices, setting up the folders for each choir member, compiling the service booklets and constantly considering all aspects of the presentation process.

We are also so fortunate to have James Clay, who skilfully sequences all the music for any new carols. His wife Joanne, presents each choir member with a practise C.D. so, we are grateful to both of them.

After the success of last year, the choir are also doing a repeat presentation of the Lesson and Carols at St. Bede's Church Semaphore on Wednesday 14th December.

So often, after the presentation, members of the audience state "I am really in the Christmas spirit now!" That is the reward for all the hard work of so many.
